
Creative Fishing Bowl Submitted by Leigh White

Cottonwoods in particular are found beside water, which is appropriate for fishing. I inlaid the metal parts of several lures along the rim and in the bottom, along with some cut-off hooks. The most impressive thing about this bowl is that I managed not to gig myself even once on the hooks!

I could have simply turned a lighthouse but he lives in a small place so I wanted to give him something that was functional and not just decorative. The woods are aspen & mahogany for the bowl, walnut for the top, and mulberry for the flame.

The bowl is cherry and is finished with a shellac sealer, then danish oil, then Beal buffed. The shape evolved as I had to keep cutting away cracks and splits on the base.



The game calls are cherry and red oak scraps. Finished with Waterlox varnish then rubbed with 0000 steel wool to remove any shine. Don't want to tip off those wiley turkeys with any unnatural reflections in the woods. The reeds are from Craft Supply. The oak one is a crow call, the cherry is an owl call. Both are used to shock a Tom turkey into gobbling to give away their location.

Here are a couple of pictures of a box that I turned recently. It is turned from a piece of Claro Walnut. It measures 2.75" in diameter and 2.12" high with a wall thickness of 5/32". The finish is several coats of clear lacquer wet sanded and polished.



Used a flare to show off the grain.**




**Maple deep plate. Hard maple. 1, 3/4
